2002 NEBCA NURSERY FINALS

The 2002 NEBCA Nursery Finals were held September 14th & 15th at the Soule Homestead Farm in Middleboro, MA. The Finals format was two runs for all competitors followed by a top-ten run-off. The score of the best qualifying run was combined with the final run to determine top-ten placings. There were 15 Novice/Novice, 21 Pro-novice, and 18 Ranch team competitors for a total of 138 runs over two days of competition. Our judge was Bill Strang from Scotland.

The Novice Trial Committee would like to thank the Soule Homestead Group for hosting the 2002 Finals, with special thanks to Rich Seaman (overall co-ordination), Connie Weller (Trial Mgr.), Rolf Knight (course set-up), Susan Cullen (scribe coordinator) and Patricia Murphy(dinner). ProNovice Champs Rich & Kess

On Pro Novice Champion Kess:

Kess, daughter of Zoe (co-owners R. Seaman and R. Knight) and Jack (R. Deschambeault), had plenty to live up to when competing in the 2002 Pro-Novice finals at Middleborough, MA. She was the only Pro-Novice dog to enjoy the home field advantage in the Finals, and her mother, Zoe, had won the Pro-Novice finals two years before. Kess is a bit hard headed, which is why she hadn't made the transition to being handled by her owner, Rolf Knight, and was handled in the Finals by her trainer, Richard Seaman.

The field at the Soule Homestead is hilly. As in all three runs, she was sent to the left. Because of the slope of the hill on that side, she needed to lose sight of the sheep for a few seconds, and during that time the sheep drifted forward toward the handler's post. When she came back into view at the top, she found the sheep quite away down the field. In spite of that, she had a good fetch, and the rest of the run went well, leaving her in first place at that moment.

Her second effort was foiled by her own cleverness. When she again lost sight of the set-out point on the outrun, she decided to pick up the sheep at the same place she had found them the first time, and reappeared from behind the hill much too early. Rich tried a 'look back' several times, but still she could not find them and Rich had to leave the post to show her the sheep. Fortunately, only the best run of the first two was being counted and so she was in good position to win, if only she could re-adjust on her outrun.

Rich could have sent her to the right on the last run, which had the advantage of allowing her to be in sight of the sheep for the entire outrun. However, 'away to me' had the disadvantage of keeping the dog a little too tight and spooking the sheep on the lift. Because of that, Rich again sent her left. We watched with suspense as she disappeared behind the top of the hill, and were rewarded with the sight of her approaching the set-out point at just the right position. She took most of her flanks for the rest of the run and scored well enough to win the combined total points for the Pro-Novice class, in spite of some nail-biting during Betty Levin's last run with her dog, Bryn.

At the time of this writing, the good news is that Kess is adjusting to being handled by me, and I am looking forward to running her at trials next year.

Ranch Champs Sue Schoen & Clair

Sue writes:

I got Clair five weeks after our daughter was born. A well-known dog handler called me and said "Congratulations! I heard you had a baby girl. I have a dog for you!" Off we went to Logan Airport in the middle of the night. Clair was almost three and had been trained by Danae Frew. It may not have been an ideal time to get a new dog but I was on maternity leave and Jessie was portable so I figured it would be OK. Clair and I were not an easy match. She was fast and tight or very wide and sulky. Often we both lost our cool especially at trials and things would fall apart- fast. She liked to push sheep hard and didn't accept my input into the equation for quite a while. Off sheep she seemed a bit lost. At home she spent alot of time in her crate or paced around the house unable to find spot. On the other hand Clair could move anything, had an outrun that I still never tire of watching and was rapidly wheedling her way into our lives. Whenever I panicked and thought I'd lost her there she'd be at my heels looking up at me. I still trip over her whenever I step backwards without looking first. For a long time I thought I wasn't good enough to run her. I had heard how beautifully she ran for Danae. I saw her run once but had been so morning sick that weekend I don't remember. For a long time it rarely felt like she was running well for me. It felt like driving a car with no brakes or steering. Several friends have helped enormously with Clair-pointing out both of our weak and strong points. And over time- and it has taken us well beyond that proverbial "year of adjustment" - we have started to become a partnership. I love her, am fortunate to own her and have learned alot in the time I have owned her.

2002 Fall Foliage Oct. 12-13, 2002 Cooperstown NY Judge: Bernie Armata

The 2002 Fall Foliage was run on a gorgeous hillside in Cooperstown NY. The site is owned by the Clark Foundation and is also home to the Leatherstocking trial. There were 38 dogs competing this year and the competition was the best we've ever seen. Barbara Leverett generously donated the sheep for the trial from her flock of Texel Cross ewes. There were about 80 yearlings that had some but not complete respect for the dogs. The site, the sheep and all the good dogs and trial folks made for a wonderful event.

The preliminary round began on Saturday and continued into Sunday until all dogs had two tries of the course. The sheep ran pretty well in spite of the damp weather. The gathers and drives were in general pretty good. But many good starts faltered in the shedding ring or at the pen, which followed. In the shed the sheep were hard to settle and even harder to split. It took persistence and bit of luck to get any sort of opening. At the pen the sheep never went in without first being convinced by handler and dog that there was no other option.

The preliminary round scores ranged from 50 to nearly 90. Most were in the 60-70 range. Bev & Kirk and Amanda & Eucher were tied at the top with 89s. Close behind was Amanda & Grace - 86, followed by Bev & Pippa - 83, Allan & Joe 82, and Denise & Kate and Mark & Burl both with 81s. The bottom score to advance to the final round was a 76. As there was a four-way tie at 76, all four dogs advanced to the finals

meaning thirteen dogs moved forward instead of the usual ten.

The hill was a splendid site for a double lift as it is very wide at the top end. The first lot of four sheep was spotted to the left, high on the hill. The turn-back post (a pumpkin in this case) was located in the center of the field right below the steep part of the From this spot it was not possible to see the second lot of four sheep on the right. This proved most upsetting to the dogs, and all but three crossed over on the second outrun and of those, only Bev's Pippa did it without any redirects. drive was to the left and followed by a shed / pen. To make the shed more challenging two of the eight sheep were marked and they and any two others had to shed off and penned. The time was set at 12 minutes

The first run was to be Walt with Jeff. Unfortunately, Jeff must have injured a foot earlier in the trial and Walt thoughtfully retired rather than let Jeff work on the hurt foot. Second up was Amanda's Eucher. The first gather was very good with only minor line points on the fetch. The second gather was very clean except for being tight on the outrun. The drive was good but too quick a turn at the cross-drive panel resulted in four of the eight sheep coming back through. Much time was used up getting the shed and the pen was not completed. Total score was 125 out of a possible 150.

Next up were Allan and Joe. Redirects were given on both outruns, but both lots were picked up without crossing. The second fetch was off line and the panel was missed. A daring call-in on the shed back-fired as one sheep broke back at the last second. The second shed attempt was good and the pen completed for a total of 105.

Third up were Denise and Kate. Kate crossed over on the second outrun but the gathers were otherwise very good. Kate lost patience on the first leg of the drive and was disqualified for a grip – hard luck.

Next was Amanda and Grace. The gathers went well except for several whistles and a near cross on the second outrun. The drive was good but points were lost on a missed shed and some trouble at the pen – total 121.

Dick and Tip were next. After a near perfect first gather Dick struggled to put Tip back to the second lot of sheep and precious time was lost. The drive was completed cleanly but time ran out during the shed - total 100.

Warren and Glen started with a good first gather but the second outrun was tight and Glen crossed over at the last second. The drive, pen and shed were completed – total 119.

Bev and Kirk started with a good first gather but Kirk crossed on the second outrun. The drive was clean but slow. The shed was completed after one missed attempt and time ran out at the pen – total 92.

Mark and Moss had a good first gather but time was lost in getting Moss back to the second lot of sheep and Moss crossed over on the second outrun. The drive was completed but time ran out in the shedding ring – total 88.

Roger and Tripp started with a good first gather but Tripp resisted being turned back for the second sheep. Time was lost and though the drive was completed they timed out at the shed – total 86.

Fall Foliage, continued....

Bev and Pippa had a near perfect first gather and the cleanest turnback of the day. On the second fetch the sheep broke hard to regroup with the first lot missing the fetch gates. The drive was very clean but the shed proved unexpectedly difficult. After two missed attempts time ran out — total 113.

Mark and Burl started well but Burl crossed on the second outrun. The drive was near perfect but again the shed proved the undoing. Mark took off the marked sheep but they re-grouped with the unmarked sheep on the way to the pen. They re-shed but time ran out at the pen—total 110.

Last up was Lorna and Dot. The first gather was very clean but a cross over and missed panel on the second fetch were costly. The drive was completed but time ran out at the shed – Total 101.

So there you have it. Amanda was first with Eucher and second with Grace (a feat that hasn't been done since 1984 when Vergil Holland was first with Sugar and second with Robin). Being home bred and home trained Eucher also received the Edgar Gould Breeders Trophy and the Long Road Trophy – for the second year running!



Phillips and Barb Armata did a


great job spotting and Allan Lynch expertly transported the sheep to and from the trial.

PROPOSED NEW RULES

At the annual meeting the Nursery Committee will propose the following changes to the Nursery Guidelines. (Effective the current trail season)

Increase the points needed to qualify for the NEBCA Nursery Finals from 1 to 3 points. Teams which have moved up in class at trials but haven't scored <u>any</u> points in the new trial class would be "grand fathered" to run the lower class <u>only</u> if they achieved 3 points in that class in the current trial season.

The Open Trial Committee is recommending the following revision to NEBCA's open trial rules. The new rules, if approved, will apply to the current trial season. The new rules provide the following changes:

- Eliminate several out dated rules or rules that state accepted practices. (e.g. rule requiring NEBCA approved judges, rule about posting of scores every few runs)
- Increase the minimum number of dogs from 12 to 15.
- Remove the implication that NEBCA is a governing organization by replacing the phrase "NEBCA sanctioned trial" with "NEBCA qualifying trial".

North East Border Collie Association Requirements for Qualifying Open Trials

(Proposed new rules to be voted on at 2003 annual meeting)

The results of qualifying open trials will be applied to NEBCA's two seasonal competitions: the High Points Competition and the Fall Foliage Championship. To be a NEBCA qualifying open trial the trial must meet the following requirements:

- 1. Trials must be located in the NEBCA region (see bylaws).
- 2. Trial dates and intentions must be agreed to by the Open Trial Committee a least 30 days before the actual trial date.
- 3. The trial must be listed in the trial schedule appearing in either the NEBCA newsletter or on the NEBCA web site. "Points trials" and "Time trials" must be listed as such.
- 4. The trial must have a minimum of 15 dogs competing.
- 5. The trial must report trial results to the Open Trial Committee within 30 days of the trial.
- 6. The NEBCA trial season ends on the Tuesday after the third weekend in September. Qualified trials occurring after this date will be applied to the next trial season.
- 7. The Open Trial Committee can vote to remove NEBCA qualifying status from any trial that does not follow what are considered standard/accepted practices; or where conditions are not conducive to the health/welfare of all animals involved.

Janet Larson Memorial Sheepdog Trial Lamprey River Farm Lee, New Hampshire October 5 & 6, 2002

Close your eyes and think of the most fun thing you could possibly do on a beautiful October weekend in New Hampshire. If you said participate in a 'country' sheepdog trial, you hit the mark. Though getting there was a trial in itself, with rain and fog prevailing on Friday night and Saturday morning, the skies cleared mid-morning Saturday and remained blue the rest of the weekend, with the sun shining warmly, and the mood happy and convivial.

Lisa Larson held the trial in memory her late sister Janet, and like the trial Janet held in October of 2000, it was for nursery classes only, and comfortably low key. However, the Larson sheep were challenging, having not been worked much over the last year, and not willing to submit to the will of the dog or handler. They were particularly reluctant – even testy - at the pen, often standing at the mouth and facing down the dogs.

On Saturday afternoon, after the NEBCA sanctioned trial, farm games began with 21 non-compete runs, and many people decided on the spur of the moment to enter their dogs in the next class on that basis to test a more challenging skill level. Later in the day, a silent gather tested many with 19 entries. This was won by Greg Hamm and Maya, who had a score of 48 out of a possible 50 points.

Cheryl Jagger Williams was the able and patient judge, first scoring the official runs of the trial, then generously scoring all of the non-compete and silent gather runs giving critiques and pointers afterwards. A marvelous dinner was shared by all Saturday night with the participants and the Larson family bringing their favorite dish which made for an abundant and delicious meal. Many thanks to Lisa and to all of the volunteers who helped participate in running this trial and have it run so smoothly. Especially those good people, who pitched in to sort sheep, kick out, set out and scribe. Special thanks going to trial managers Greg and Cokie Hamm, and to Betty Murray for her marvelous organizational skills in record keeping. It was a wonderful weekend and a lovely tribute to Janet.

Meeting called to order at 6:20 p.m, 26 members present

Old Business
