The 2003 Fall Foliage Championship trial was held October 10-12, 2003, in Turbotville, Pennsylvania. Allan and Peg Lynch arranged for the use of the field, (big and tricky) and the flock of sheep, (a lightly dogged commercial wool flock). Both field and sheep were worthy of Nebca's year end Open championships. Many thanks to Allan & Peg! This year's Fall Foliage was expanded to three days, allowing for two full days of qualifying runs, with the top 15 scoring teams advancing to Sunday's double lift. Dal Kratzer made the trip from Michigan to judge the entire event.

For Friday and Saturday's qualifying runs, four sheep were set slightly off center to the right, in the big rectangle-shaped field. The field presented interesting challenges. Dogs sent to the left lost sight of the sheep for a considerable distance, and ran out of their handler's sight as well. Most dogs sent to the right were mysteriously drawn in tight, and many experienced open dogs crossed over as their handlers shouted and whistled desperately to redirect them. Fetches were difficult as the pressure to the hold out pen and exhaust pen, both on the left, created a strong draw, and many dogs would not flank off to correct the fetch line. The sheep were a savvy bunch and quick to exploit any weakness in the dogs and take advantage of opportunities to simply stop moving, or to escape off the course or back to the exhaust. Several dogs stalled out on the drive.

Once the drive was complete, the qualifying run format required a two-two split, regroup, then pen. Splitting proved easier than penning. The sheep were quite difficult to pen and required

## A Note from the President

Hi Everyone,

It was another busy year within the NEBCA region with more events and happenings than ever. In addition to the numerous trials and clinics, there were many informal gatherings amongst our members for training and practice and fun. 
Sunday's double lift format required a right hand outrun to pick up the first group of five sheep, which were held near the qualifying run set out point. Two sheep wore collars. Some dogs who had been sent to the left in both qualifying runs were confused by the right hand outrun and crossed over. Holding the fetch line was again difficult and many fetches were considerably off line toward the exhaust pressuure.

The second packet of five sheep was held on the left side of the field. Those dogs that were successfully directed back to the second packet fought left side field pressure to fetch the second group to the first. Our judge directed that teams had eight minutes to accomplish the double lift outwork, and fetch the 10 sheep to the handler's feet. Teams that did not accomplish this in eight minutes were retired, but permitted to keep points earned.

Most drives in the double lift final went fairly well. The sheep definitely seemed to drive better in a bigger groups. Upon completing the drive, handlers had to split the group five and five, retaining a group of five which contained both the collared sheep. Again, the draw to the exhaust was strong and dogs had to work hard to stop collared sheep from escaping toward the exhaust. The handlers had to pen the correct group of five, then proceed back to the shedding ring and shed off the two collared sheep to complete the course.

A special congratulations to **Fall Foliage Champions Warren Mick and Glen**. Their championship run was smooth, quiet and confident, really fun to watch. (More about Warren & Glen to follow!) All fifteen finalist teams should be commended. It was truly a challenging trial, and a wonderful test of our dogs' skills. Running a double lift format is very labor intensive and required the efforts of several volunteers to coordinate. Thanks to everyone who pitched in to make the trial a success!

# WARREN MICK & GLEN 2003 FALL FOLIAGE AND HIGH POINTS CHAMPIONS

Warren writes:

Glen, being modest as most Border Collies are, has little to say regarding the success he's had this year. So it falls in my lap to say something nice about him. He's basically a good dog and listens pretty well, most of the time.

[Ok, Ok, get down, get down, I'll write more]

I'd love to relate some great stories from Glen's youth or early training but frankly, I don't recall any. Partly, it's because it all went along so easily. Unlike other dogs I' ve had, I don't ever remember wondering if Glen would ever learn something or how to get the point across or how to stop some bad habit. He just picked things up quickly and without a lot of fuss. It's not that he's a genius or anything, he just has a good balance of focus between stock and handler. He's as intent to work stock, as he is to work as a team. That's made training, working and competing with him a real pleasure.

[Would you please, if you want me to keep writing there'll be no more paws on the desk]

We got Glen as pup from Mike Canaday back in September 1998. Maria seems to have a knack at selecting a pup and she gets the credit for picking Glen out of a litter of nine. The litter was out of Tip by Nap.

Nap and Tip are both well known in the northeast nowadays, but not back in 98. At the time, I had only seen Nap run once before – it was at the Fourth of July trial at Canaday's, the infamous "Texas Day", a story in itself. But suffice it so say that not many runs finished the course that day, only fourteen of sixty as I recall and Nap wasn't one. But Nap, faced with a truly hopeless lot, made a valiant attempt

at keeping the run going, showing a lot of spirit and drive. And what sticks in my mind is seeing Naps immediate response to every command, as if he knew it was coming. Since then, Nap has made his mark in our area both in competitions, running for Bev Lambert, Lin Reuther and now Sue Schoen, and in producing many good dogs. I still like watching him work.

[Yes, Yes, I know your mom too.]

The other half of Glen was Tip – the same Tip run so successfully by Dick Williams for the last several years. Dick got Tip from Mike who in turn got her from Alasdair as qualified nursery dog. I had seen Mike run Tip in a few novice trials and also seen them out training many times. She seemed a good solid dog with plenty of power, and more go than stop. And of late, watching Tip run for Dick, I still see the same qualities. Dick summarized Tip's nature pretty well in a comment he made following a run this past year, "She's got a lot of heart". That's a large part of what I like to see in a dog.

So that's where Glen is from. Maybe he was a lucky pick from the litter. More likely the case, however, is that with Tip and Nap as parents, the deck was stacked a bit in our favor.

One last thought, from me. You really have to hold the line with these dogs. If not, they can end up running your life.

#### Green Lane Sheepdog Trial Sept. 6 & 7, 2003 Green Lane, PA

Among the bucolic farms of the northeastern corner of Montgomery County, Pennsylvania there sits a gem of park which has hosted the Scottish-Irish Festival for the past four years. It's estimated the the festival drew more than 100,000 visitors for the two day event thanks in part to the Green Lane Sheepdog Trials which has been held in conjuction with the festival for the past two years. The undulating trial field, though small by some standards, was able to support an outrun of 200 yards for the ranch and open classes. Driving was very tricky as the pressure would slowly pull the sheep up high on the cross and many dogs would overcorrect, making the sheep miss the panels low, or the optical illusion was that the sheep were on line and the handler would not flank the dog, missing the panels high. The sheep themselves were very well mannered as long as your dog was not too pushy and if it was, well, the reaction was more like a pinball rather than sheep. In the spirit of the festival Gene Sheninger gave us a good look at his legs as he and his kilt left us wondering how breezy a Scotsman gets.

An excellent judge of dog, Barb Levinson assumed those duties for one of the most difficult classes to judge, the novice/novice. One has to wake up early and be ready to concentrate on a run that may have sheep, dog and handler all over the field and for this we extend our deepest gratitude to Barb. Our judge for the pro-novice, ranch and open classes was Eve Marschark of Bedminster, Pa. She spent two beautiful days concentrating on each nuance of every run giving us all her fair and consistent opinion, again our appreciation goes out to her. Thanks to all our volunteers, especially Deb Kramer for her organizational and math skills; tackling the task of scorekeeping is not easy. Thanks to Sue Asten for her world class announcing as well as Gene Sheninger, Ron Mcgettigan (who, along with Sharon Nunan provided us with a very healthy flock--thanks!!), Pat Warne and Heather Millen. Our hold-out people were superb, a job becoming more difficult as the sheep got wise to the game; hats off to Nancy Ortiz-Sharp, Dave Sharp, Lori Cunningham, Michele Higgins, Greg Hamm, Cokie Hamm, Susanne Craddock, Janet Harvey, Barb Armata, Barb Klein (and anyone else I may have forgotten)! The exhaust was handled very well by Dave Fetterman, Ken Freson and Pat Warne enabling the runs to go smoothly and quickly. See you all next year!



#### TACKABERY FARM SDT October 3 & 4, 2003

Weather was changeable at Tackaberry Farm SDT held the weekend of October 3 and 4, 2003, with occasional showers, blustery winds and periods of sunshine. The hilly terrain and lively sheep presented an interesting challenge to handlers coming from as far away as Pennsylvania, Michigan, New York and Quebec. Our judge Alasdair MacRae set a challenging but workable Open course with an outrun of 335 yards and drive of some 540 yards total, followed variously by single, pen and chute in different combinations. By and large, the laurels went to the teams that were able to achieve and maintain a steady pace on the course right from the lift.

My thanks and appreciation to the many volunteers who made for a successful and smooth running trial. Louise and Mark were hosts extraordinaire, putting in many many hours of work improving and adding fencing and gates and building let out and exhaust facilities with the help of their volunteer work crew. Mark created the fiendish cattle squeeze chute used as an obstacle in the final run of Open to order. Mark's relatives ran the food tent for lunch. Paul and Janet created a data base that provided up to the minute results on a computer screen in the handlers' tent and did many other necessary tasks. Peter organized the set out roster. Sheri shopped, cooked and organized food for the judges and pen crew. The pen crew, Gary and Anthony, were tremendous and never let me down, always ensuring that sheep were on their way to the set out point at the right time. Various handlers volunteered to set out and did a fine job of it. Janice pitched in everywhere in her usual capable style. Terry was there to support me as she always is. Lori provided steadfast support and a helping hand wherever she was needed. Kate gave us a thrill, decisively beating her husband Dal in a runoff for first place in one of the four Open runs, and kept me on track throughout.
