MINUTES FROM THE MAY 3RD MEETING

The meeting was called to order at 11:40 AM at U Conn on 5/2/86.
Minutes of the 1/12/86 meeting were read and accepted. It was reported that everything on the ballot was passed.

The treasurer's report was read and accepted. The treasurer reported that we have \$3500.00 in the account, but the calenders haven't been paid for yet.

Old Business: It was reported that the calendar is finished and hopefully will be ready to sell at Cummington Sheep Dog Trial. If not ready for Cummington, they will be ready for the Penn. Open Trial at Walt Jagger's on 6/21/86.

There was discussion on the package deal that Mike Canaday is putting together. Walt Jagger had an inquirey about the package, but the person lost interest when a \$1000.00 fee was discussed.

Pat Canaday asked what to do with the 1986 calendars. She was told to give them away--pass them out to members.

It was reported that Denise Leonard needs new pictures for the 1987 calendar! (Editor's note: We think they mean 1988!)

A trophy in memory of Preston Davenport was discussed.

Walter Jagger discussed the idea of getting Tom Wilson to judge our Fall Foliage Trial. Mr. Wilson would be interested in doing the judging for \$200.00. Edgar Gould said he is looking into getting Doug Lamb from Scotland to come here to judge the Fall Foliage Trial.

New Business: There was discussion about the need to look for a sponsor for the Fall Foliage Trial. Maybe Alpo. Beverly Lambert suggested giving the trophies for high points away at Fryeburg Fair where there is more of a crowd. It may make it easier to find a sponsor, like Alpo.

There was discussion about formulating a budget for the Fall Foliage Trial. We need to figure out how much we need from a sponsor. It was decided that this was the Trial Committee's responsibility.

Border Collie Handling Assn. members need to pay their dues now. Especially before they start a trial.

It was decided that the next NEBCA meeting will be held at Cummington, MA, at 9:00 AM on Sunday May 25th. Mike Canaday made a motion to accept when the next meeting was to be held, and it passed.

Bonnie Holland made a motion to adjourn the meeting; everyone seconded, it passed and the meeting was adjourned at 12:00PM.

MINUTES OF THE MAY 25 MEETING

The minutes from the Connecticut Trial meeting were read and approved. The Trial Committee announced that Doug Lamb from Scotland would be the

judge for the Champioship Trial.

Vergil Holland announced that the State of Massachusetts has funds available for improvements of fairgrounds. This could take the form of matching funds for the purchase of Netlon snowfencing with the Pioneer Valley Sheep Breeders Ass'n. (This is the Association which hosts the Cummington Trial.) If we match funds with the Pioneer Valley Sheep Breeders, this fencing could be available for use by NEBCA for puppy days, clinics, and trials. Becky Peterson stated that the fence would have to be stored in Massachusetts, but could be used throughout the Northeast. A motion was made that NEBCA would match funds with the Pioneer Valley Sheep Breeders Association toward the purchase of Netlon fencing.

Pam Headley announced that Mike Canaday's sheep will be used at the

Beaverkill Trial.

Denise and Kristen are planning an invitational trial in the fall; they plan on inviting the handlers that were unable to qualify for the Championship Trial.

Edgar Gould reminded the Association concerning the Supreme Champion Trophy. This would be awarded in the event that the High Point Champion also wins the Championship Trial. This trophy will be paid for by donations from the handlers. Total value of the trophy will be around \$150.00.

A motion was made to adjourn the meeting and was seconded!

At last, here it is! The long awaited results to the Border Collie survey I sent out a year ago. Throughout the analysis of the response data, I continually found more and more ways in which to analyze the data. But, I guess I've been at it long enough! What follows are the results and conclusions from the different data bases and distribution frequencies that I was able to constuct. You might draw some conclusions of your own from the information provided.

Out of a possible 118 responses, I received 70. That means that 59.3% of the membership responded. The following information is therefore based on the portion of the NEBCA members that responded. I would have liked to have had at least a 75% response before considering this survey representative of this association, but I am told that this is considered a high response vote for a mailed questionaire.

The total number of dogs owned is 184. The average nember of dogs owned is 2.6. Since only a few members own a large number of dogs, a distribution frequency gives a beeter representation of the number of dogs owned. This can be thought of as "the most common number of dogs owned".

About 60% own only 1 or 2 dogs, 35% own 3-6 dogs, and only about 5% own over 6 dogs (7-15). If you consider this information with the fact that 50 of the respondants, or about 71% have livestock of their own, it's easy to draw the conclusion that most of NEBCA's Border Collie owners use their dogs to help manage their stock, but probably don't keep them for a large scale breeding operation. It may have been interesting to have asked what kind of livestock people owned, and how many. (Maybe next time!) This brings us to Border Collie use.

The question concerning how the members of NEBCA used their Border Collies brought interesting results. Those surveyed were asked to check as many uses listed as applied. The most common response checked was Pet/Companions. This applied to those that work their dogs and those that have them only as pets. I think this was a nice opinion to hear. It confirms the assumption that these stock dogs are not just employees, but valuable, full time partners for those that use them daily.

The next most common response under "use" was Working Livestock as a Hobby. This was followed closely by Sheepdog trials. If you look at these two catagories by the frequency with which they occur in relation to the number of dogs owned, you find that both catagories increase proportionately to an increase in the number of dogs owned. Or in plain English, I would say that those owning more than one dog are more apt to be involved with working and trialing those dogs. This occurence, along with the close response relationship between working and trialing is not too surprising. Wouldn't most people who work their BCs on livestock want to test their dogs at a trial? Not necessarily! If you add the working for hobby and working for livelihood catagories together you come up with 55 people that work their BCs on livestock. Yet only 31 people compete at sheepdog trials. NEBCA will have to convince those other 24 people that work livestock but don't trial to start competing! Actually,...23; one interesting individual checked Sheepdog Trials, but neither Working Livestock catagory! I wonder how they do?!

Breeding came in fourth with 29 positive responses. Analysis of this catagory definately benefitted from a frequency distribution based on the number of dogs owned. Only six of those breeding have 1 dog. The remaining 23 had 2 or more. Perhaps those that breed their BCs have more BCs BECAUSE they breed them! (Instead of the other way around!)

Working livestock as part of their livelyhood came in fifth with a respectable 23 responses. This question might have been somewhat misleading though, since it essentially asks, "Do you farm for a living?" The only people other that might have checked it would be those that derive their living from

training services, etc... and use livestock to do so. Or as in my case, work full time on another farm and use their own BC's daily. Part time farmers that recieve a portion of their income from farming may have checked this one if they felt that their dog(s) contributed strongly to the running of their farming enterprise. If you look at the figures on the types of livestock worked and cross reference it with the people that said they owned livestock, it illuminates the picture more. For instance, 5 of the people who checked that they worked dairy cows also checked that they owned livestock. I think it is safe to assume that these people are dairy farmers and use their BCs on the farm. It is of course only an assumption, since I did not ask what types of livestock people owned. But if you look at the figures in the chart below, it certainly seems to be a logical conclusion to draw in each of the catagories.

Border Collies are beginning to gain fame in the obedience trial world, which is why I included that as a choice rather than leaving it to the "other" catagory. This assumption seems to have been true since about 12.8% of the respondants checked this choice. The "other" catagory came in 1 response ahead of obedience trials, but the comments greatly varied.

The results of the types of livestock worked were no great surprise. Ofcourse sheep won by a mile (over 75%). It did surprise me a little that fowl were tied with beef for second. I just didn't know that so many people worked birds! "Other" again beat out some catagories, again with an amazing variety of comments. Dairy and goats tied for fifth, which would probably bug the heck ou of the dairy people. I'm a bit surprised that the dairy catagory wasn't checked more. But then our organization may not be a very representative sample of the New England Dairyman. Congratulations to the 7.1% that work their dogs on goats, Most of our goats would prefer to work the dog! And last but not least are those who work horses and pigs. In another part of the country, I'm sure swine and beef would be right up there with sheep.

For your enjoyment, here are the "other" comments I received.
