

The training clinic is limited to the first 15 dogs for which entries are received.

Rules: All dogs must have current vaccinations for canine distemper hepatitis, leptospirosis, parainfluenza, parvo virus, and rabies. All dogs must be on leash or confined to a crate or vehicle except when working. Participants will be responsible for any livestock injury caused by their dog.

**Lunch:** We will do pot luck lunches each day and if you plan to join us please specify on your entry form if you would like to bring a main dish, salad, or dessert.

Directions: From the Washington D.C. area: Take 195 North; exit on Rt. 32 west; exit on Rt. 108 east towards Ellicott City; go through Clarksville; go through the traffic light at Harpers Farm road on the right and Homewood Road on the left; stay on Rt. 108 and the entrance to the farm is 1 mile on the left.\*\*Follow the farm lane to the first barn on the left and park there for the training clinic; \*\* The handling clinic will be at the first field on the left after you come in the farm lane.

From the Baltimore area: Take the Baltimore Beltway Rt. 695 to Rt. 70 west: Exit on Rt, 29 south; exit on Rt. 108 west; go through 3 traffic lights; take the second farm lane on the right and proceed as above.

From the Frederick area: Take Rt. 70 east; exit on Rt. 40 east, Turn right on Centennial Lane or detour just before the Exxon Station on your right; turn right onto Centennial Lane (1st light); go to the 3rd light and turn right onto Rt. 108 and take the 2nd farm lane on the right and proceed as above.

### **KEVIN EVANS -** An interview with NEBCA NEWS

Kevin Evans won the 2008 International Supreme Championship with Mirk at the ripe old age of 27. He visited Carol Campion's Bittersweet Farm in June for a series of Clinics. In between telling me that "Carol has everything you need to train dogs here" he regaled me with tales of trials in Wales and his journey as a young handler from Libanus in the beautiful Brecon Beacons to his epic victory at the International last year

**Kevin Evans sensed** his dog's tension as they walked to the post at the 2008 International Supreme Championship in Abergele, North Wales.

"I could see Mirk was excited – desperate to go," he recalled. "So, it took me a bit of time to set him up, to calm him down and gather his thoughts."

As is often the case with talented athletes, the nervous tension was used to full advantage.

"The turn-back is what everybody's looking for at the International," Kevin continued. "It took me a couple of whistles to get him through the trees and behind his sheep. But he hardly lost any points on the gather and fetch. He won the best outwork at the Championship."

I asked how the dog could perform at such a level with visible tension and nerves. Kevin described Mirk's particular talent.

"Sheep don't spread out with Mirk. He's got a great natural ability to hold on the heavy side of sheep. That means he can really hold them together and hold them straight."

I wondered if that was something that could be trained into a dog. He paused before answering:

"You can train some of it with a lot of hard work, but either they've got it or they haven't."

Kevin explained:

"My dad trained Mirk. I could see that the dog had something extra when he was four or five months old; he had the determination to do something more than other dogs. He had good natural flanks, but the first thing - and the hardest thing - was to get a good stop on him."

"That's because he was so keen and so intent on working. In time, he developed. With patience and training, he became a good stopper."

It was refreshing to hear that the reigning International Supreme Cham-



pion had faced something that we all see with young dogs at trials and on the training field every day - a dog that wouldn't stop. This revelation led to some interesting insights into Kevin's key to success. Training. He loves to train.

### **A Training Machine**

"In the summer I train four to five hours every night if I'm not at a trial. My trial dogs get an hour each and I give the others ten minutes each. My dogs have to like training. I don't like a sulky dog that mopes about after a correction."

"They've got to have their own natural balance and the ability to hold sheep on line. They have to have plenty of power. But, in the training sessions they must work like robots when needed to - they have to do what I want them to do. Success or failure in this game is down to the tiniest margins. There's no room for mistakes."

For a sport (or a way of life) long dominated by people of age, wisdom and experience, it's remarkable that Kevin Evans was only twenty-seven when he won the International. With that in mind, it was strange to hear him say "I waited a long time for that victory" although in context that's a relevant statement - he started working sheepdogs when he was four years old!

### **An Early Start**

"My granddad was fed up of me trying to pinch his dogs so he gave me a useful dog – a funny little bugger, but good around the farm. At seven I got the bug for it and got in the money (won a ribbon) when I entered Tweed, my first trial dog in a local trial near Brecon."

His fledgling career flourished from a potent combination of beginner's luck and precocious genius.

"Mostyn Isaac, a friend of my grandfather's from Ebbw Vale called me up and said 'l've got a good bitch l'd like you to run.' He lent me Maid, one of his experienced dogs."

After a few weeks of trialing and placing ever higher in the Breconshire Nursery league, Maid and Kevin won their fourth trial together.

He was ten years old. His recollection? "Maid was ideal for a beginner. I was lucky I had a good one to start with."

Mostyn Isaac let him run Maid for the next two years until he entered his first Open in Meidrim, Carmarthenshire. This coincided with Kevin's twelfth birthday, the day Mr. Isaac presented him with Maid's registration papers as a gift, proving the old adage that a good competitor makes his own luck. She was a gift with a lasting value. In 1999 a half-brother and sister out of Maid won the Welsh Brace. One of her daughters, Jess made it to the Welsh Singles team in 2000.

#### Jaff, the Hidden Gem

Lightning doesn't usually strike twice, but a similar story developed a few years later. Kevin had been watching a capable farm dog called Jaff bounce from one sheepdog sale to another. He liked the dog, but every time the gavel hit the wood the price was just out of his reach. The last time, he was outbid by Evan Dyke, a farmer from Hereford just across the

border in England. Kevin congratulated him: 'You've bought a good dog there.'

Kevin continued: "Mr. Dyke started trialing Jaff, but he couldn't really get on with him and he developed some health problems so he couldn't work the dog much. After a year, he called me and asked me if I'd trial him. He wasn't happy with the situation because the dog was tied up in the barn, fat and unfit."

"My dad worked him first, but they didn't click, so he asked me to take him."

The rest is Welsh folklore: "By then Jaff was seven. I ran him at a couple of nationals and got him into the Welsh team every year till he retired."

By then, Evan Dyke had given him the dog.

So, for the second time in his life, he had been gifted a dog with which he expanded his horizons. Jaff is the cornerstone of his breeding line, fathering his two prize-winning dogs, Mirk and Spot. Another lucky break? Undoubtedly, but Kevin took a seven year old dog and turned him into something special.

What both of his benefactors, Mostyn Isaac and Evan Dyke must have seen is

that Kevin Evans has always had an eye for a good dog and he knows how to maximize its potential in training. Call it focus. He knows what he wants. He knows how to find it. He concentrates on training – training his own line to win trials, training quality dogs to sell. Kevin explained his strategy with sheepdogs.

#### It's all about the dogs

"Between me and my father, we look at forty to fifty dogs per year. I have my own little Jaff line; I don't need any more dogs for myself. But I look for the best dogs I can find to sell to top trial people."

He went on to give his definition of "best dogs" - the holy grail we all seek.

"I like a dog that's really determined, full of it, that tries his best all the time. He really has to love training. I want to see him go straight up or down the hill and over a wall to get to his sheep; I want to see him try to jump a fence rather than lie down by it wanting to be helped over, or running up and down it trying to fiddle his way through."

As he completed his thought, I could have been listening to a management consultant:

"It takes a lot longer to train a bad dog than it does to train a good one; I'd rather spend my time training a dog with a future."

At that point, one could see past the youthful good looks, the charming Welsh accent, the un-farmer like attire. On display was the type of laser-like focus that settled Mirk at the International. Stark and simple, this focus coupled with long hours on the training field have made Kevin Evans what he is - a winner in his field.

Asked where he goes from here, he was modestly non-committal.

"My goals? To keep going. The more you win, the more you want to win. But, if you don't win today, there's always tomorrow."


This is a man with many more tomorrows than most in today's game.

### YANKEE - July 2, 1993 - July 17, 2009



Yankee was born in Edwardsville, Illinois, bred by Larry Gaertner. He was bought and trained by Monty Hogue from Sorento, Illinois. Yankee's sire had been imported from Scotland, but his dam was home bred and trained. Yankee was born on a farm and was just a plain ole farm dog. That's how he got his name. Back then, most US handlers were importing their dogs from Britain. But not Yankee. So Monty named him after the term used by the Brits to identify us Americans, not a fancy import, just a plain ole American farm dog.

I bought Yankee at the National Finals held in Lexington, Kentucky in 1994. Yankee ran in the Nursery Finals that year under Monty at the age of 14 months (the trial limited to dogs under 3 years old by June 30 of the trial year). He had to qualify for the Finals before July 31, 1994. Thus, he ran and qualified in trials before he was a year old. Amazing. Yankee qualified with me the next two years, one of few dogs able to compete in the National Nursery Finals for three years. He was able to do so because of his birth date, and, of course, because of his ability.

We had a glorious partnership. He won the NEBCA Pro-Novice Finals in 1995; he won the NEBCA Ranch Finals in 1996. He placed in his first Open trial in 1997. We WON trials. We placed in the National Finals, he was my right arm for so many years. He had an intuitive sense of what was expected of a job. He really did know what a person wanted or needed done. He was fearless and, of course, had no sense of self-preservation. He'd stop a charging ram and catch an escaping ewe. It didn't matter much which farm, training or lesson chore I gave him, he'd carry it out willingly, with gusto. Yankee hung on until he turned 16. I guess he felt he'd lived long enough and just couldn't go on any longer.

I'm going to miss him terribly.



### A Greenhorn and a Kelpie by Julie Williams

I suppose I am very similar to many other folks who got into sheep dog trialing with their dogs. It wasn't planned in any way, but it happened. And, it happened with a Kelpie.

No big deal, I suppose that my first "herding" dog was a Kelpie, except, I chose to go the traditional Border Collie route, and train for ISDS style trials. Some Kelpies have done quite successfully, but I think I can count on one hand, the Kelpies who have run in trials primarily in the North East- out west is a different story. Still fewer are those of us who have run only Kelpies, and no other breed at the trials. But, one thing about this great country we live in, we have the option to run with



Being a greenhorn, there are lots of things that were very foreign to me. Like lines. You know, the line from the post to the drive away gates, that sort of thing. To me, with all my nerves and a dog who is very keen to cover at all costs, lines don't come easy when wearing said dog. And, lines, well, should I say, lack of them cost you big. That was a big lesson.

Another lesson I have learned in my infancy in this sport, is that the open handlers who have been doing this for so long are so full of knowledge, that it is important to not only listen to them, but watch them. See how they comport themselves, their relationship with their dogs. That's another thing I learned relatively early on. You cannot proceed with a dog that chooses to ignore the down, or stop you have requested. At first, I used to think it wasn't that necessary, that we could muddle through. Well, after lots of failure and screaming, I realized that things could be so much easier if my dog just took that down, and now, finally, I enforce it every time I ask for it. And, because of that, we have progressed.

Kelpies should have good stock sense. My Kelpie has this and that has saved my bacon on many occasions. Many times I will be caught out, watching my dog figure something out, when I should be a bit more "involved". Another lesson learned.

All along our training, Lucy and I have worked with Border Collies. I think I have worked along another Kelpie just once. Not that it matters. When you are out there on the field working your dog, it doesn't matter what breed you're with, it's the work that matters. Just because the dog is a Kelpie, does not mean it can slice flanks, ignore stops, and push too hard? I have to mention one special Border Collie, who I believe is greatly responsible for my allencompassing focus on sheep herding - Warren Mick's Glen.

Glen has a classic, and beautiful way about him on sheep. When we first started taking lessons, I remember Warren asking Glen to set up to fetch sheep. Glen would glide over to Warren's side, and scan for the sheep. He was intensely focused on what he was about to be asked to do. I secretly hoped that some day I would have a dog that would do that.... Well, several months down the road, Warren was going to demonstrate something for me on the outrun; he tapped his leg for Glen to come to his side, and Glen obliged. Then, he tapped his other leg, and Lucy came up to the other side, and set herself up exactly like Glen, and I was awe struck. It was quite a picture. I think "awe struck" could probably be the best descriptive I have for my first two years in sheep herding. It never ceases to amaze me how much we can get from sheepdogs, and how little (as in nothing) they ask in return.

Our time on the trial field, though pretty short, has been a good experience. There is so much support and also commiseration when things go wrong that you can't help but want to continue and learn and get better. Aim high, and be a better trainer. Remember that your dog is a product of your training. Which, brings me to what I love the most about this "sheep herding" with my dog. Training. I love it. I love to be out on the field with my dog, working on things that need a bit of tweaking, enjoying the successes, figuring out how to fix the issues, and taking in each moment out there as a gift. I hope as the years go on, I continue feeling this way. Continue enjoying each moment with my dog. Continue being awed when I see young pups turn on, and seem to know what they are doing, and most of all appreciate that there is so much more that these sheepdogs do for us, than just the physical work; they make us see that the joy is not in the destination, it's in the journey.

Thank you Lucy, it has been one excellent adventure.

Editor's Note: Although the mast-head says Northeast <u>Border Collie</u> Association, it's interesting to see a different view from a team that competes regularly against Border Collies. Julie Williams and her Kelpie, Lucy won the Novice Novice Class at Fetch Gate Farm Trial in July.

### The World of Sheepdogs. A Review by Donna Brinkworth

The World of Sheepdogs

Dew flying, morning sun, grass shivering...dog, frozen in action, eyes blazing and lips curled...sheep leaning away... an eternal moment captured forever by the photographer's lens. Such is the nature of the sheep dog and the world it inhabits, presented to the reader in this new book that is art born of observation.

In this electronic world, I still like the weight and smell of a real book. Especially a book like The World of Sheepdogs, A Photographic Tribute. This intimate and revealing book transports the reader to perfect mornings on the field. When working our own dogs we don't see the close-up, spectacular views pictured in this book. The dogs literally fly off the pages.

Dogs belonging to the top men and women in the sport are pictured, attractive and fresh in their angles and composition. At such close range we realize we could be at home on any field in the World, as long as we have grass, sheep and a dog at hand.

This book was a loving project conceived by Angie Driscoll while she served as the Webmaster for the 2008 World Trials in Llandeilo Wales. Seizing on opportunity, she and her husband Kelvin Broad captured photographs of Border Collies at the ISDS and World Trials in Wales. Photos from the Continental Sheep dog Champion-

ships in Germany are contributed by Joachim Homm. In itself, that makes this book a time capsule, portraying extraordinary events and dogs.

Those who love detail will not be disappointed as rich content is interwoven amidst the photos. Crisp and sparsely presented, the text enhances the photos of dogs in action. A biography of each handler is provided, along with the story of each dog, career highlights and pedigree. At the end of the book are lists of World Champions, International Supreme Champions, Continental Champions, USBCHA Champions and Scandinavian Champions.

But there's more.

In the introduction, Angie says the book puts a face on the humble sheep dog, reminding us that Border Collies "are working dogs first and foremost, performing their job with enthusiasm, courage, intensity, tenacity, athleticism and even beauty."

The word beauty is loaded with connotation when used in the same breath as the words 'working sheep dog.' The Society notes the working Border Collie has never been bred for appearance and the ISDS Border Collie has no breed standard. Yet, stand on the sidelines of any field, anywhere in the World and take a moment to look at the faces of the most hardened

competitor. There you will see an expression confirming that watching a dog work sheep is indeed a beautiful sight.

This book helps define the beauty of the working Border Collie by capturing the dog in action. The dogs speak for themselves, and the photos drive the message home – it is not the colour or coat pattern, size or shape of the dogs that make them beautiful - the dogs are beautiful in their work. The dogs at the top of the sport exemplify the principles of breeding dogs that excel at their work. Moreover, we know from the pedigree of each dog that they embody the glory of their ancestors and are a living legacy to the many breeders and trialers whose vision and hard work are reflected in each photo.

The World of Sheepdogs, A Photographic Tribute portrays the dogs belonging to young handlers like Kevin Evans of Wales and International Supreme Champion Mirk as well as up and comers

> like Chloe Cropper and Roy of England. Dogs belonging to pillars of the sport like Aled Owen and Bobby Dalziel are also pictured.

Top working sheep dogs from around the World grace the pages. Teams like Scott Glen and Pleat of Canada, the first Canadian team to win the USBCHA and the first team in history to win the big four trials in North America. From the USA - Alasdair MacRae and his dog Nap - MacRae being the most winning handler of the USBCHA trials in North America. From New Zealand, Jim Wilson is featured with his dog Tweed. From South Africa, Faansie Basson and Jill. The list goes on as Driscoll takes us around the World with

the help of guest contributors who provided additional photos.

Yet as we travel around the World whilst sitting in our own living room with book in hand, it is not so much each country we visit, but the country inhabited by the dogs and sheep. When looking through the book, I feel the same surge of pride in my own Border Collies as any top competitor has felt on the trial field. The World of Sheepdogs, A Photographic Tribute is a book that will appeal to everyone who has loved the working Border Collie.

The legacy of Walt Jagger was alive and well at this year's Sheepy Hollow Farm Trial. The well-conditioned sheep, the perfectly mowed grass, the impeccable organization by Cheryl Jagger-Williams, Dick Williams, Annie Palmer with legions of family and friends. This all lead to an impressive four days of high-caliber sheepdog trialing. The only aspect that was not impeccably controlled was the rain - it fell in buckets!

As ever, the Open course was set up to be hard, but the variables were the combination of torrential rain, the resulting erratic sheep and the locked open pen. These inter-related challenges made it extremely difficult (for the majority impossible) to complete the course on Saturday. The rain was so intense that many dogs could hear neither voice commands nor whistles. The packets of one ewe, one yearling and one lamb were pixie-fresh, fit as fiddles, fast and tricky. On the Saturday there were only 31 scores out of the 75 runs. The rest were DQd or Retired.

However, Gene Sheninger and Jen made light of all the gathered gloom with an extremely good run and a score of 93. Dean Holcomb and Star came second with 87. Another performance of note was by Linda Comeau from Canada. In her first season in Open, she came 4th on that difficult first day with a score of 83.

The sheep behaved much better on the second day. Gene Sheninger won again with Lori Cunningham taking second place.

By the time the Novice Classes turned up for Days 3 & 4, the hard to handle lambs had been replaced with ewes and yearlings, benign weather and drier parking fields. Amy Yoho and Mick stormed away with the Novice Novice title with 77s on both days. In Pro Novice, Ann Devine and Tip put up a beautiful run on Monday to win the day with a 78, but Joe Evans and Peg took advantage of an immediate rerun on the second day with a 78 - just enough to take the overall two day championship. JP Lalonde and Nell took time off from their brilliant work at set-out to win Ranch on the Monday, but Michele Higgins and Dream put in a good performance to win it on Tuesday with a score of 84. Nursery was won handily by Rose Anderson with Jing on Monday and Buzz on Tuesday.

Hop Bottom is a sought-after venue - rightly so. Handlers came from Michigan, Ohio, the Carolinas and Georgia. There was also a large contingent of Canadians heading south for the rain.

Thanks to the organizers for a memorable trial.



69 Once again, the Millens went all out to 64 present a wonderful venue for sheep dog trialing, attending to every last detail. 64 Their Fetch Gate Farm is located in up-63 state New York in a beautiful agricultural part of the state. The views are spectacu-63 lar and the trial field is a spacious, gently 61 rolling uphill course. 60

46 The weather this year was reminiscent of another year - water, water, everywhere! Bands of rain and showers hovered 43 over the Fetch Gate trial on Thursday and Friday, occasionally covering all in a deluge of wind-driven rain, but never dampening the spirits of either dogs, or sheep or handlers. By Saturday morning, 74 the long-awaited fair weather arrived with clear blue skies and dry comfortable temperatures. The good weather lasted 71 through the remainder of the trial and 62 made for an enjoyable holiday weekend.

62 On Thursday & Friday, the Novice han-61 dlers were tested with a Katahdin ewe and two lambs. The sheep were wonderfully fit and if handled properly, could be 61 walked around the course. If pushed, they 59 let the dogs know they were wrong! The course for all classes was uphill and al-58 lowed great visibility for the handlers and spectators.

For Open, fresh sheep were added with 79 the ewes being replaced by new Katahdin 78 ewes. The lambs remained. As in the younger classes, if handled properly, the 78 sheep were very cooperative and good 77 handling was rewarded with high scores. It was a standard course with a 300 yard 72 outrun, a long drive, pen & shed. But the 71 biggest challenge of the two days of Open proved to be the wiley sheep on the 68 shed. Only a few good sheds were 65 achieved during the weekend and handlers did well to get any shed at all! 63

The Novice classes were judged by Maria Mick. Warren Mick judged Open. J. P. Lalonde was responsible for the quality set-out he is known for in Open and the handlers pitched in to help spot the Novice

The atmosphere and attention to detail at this trial make it one not to miss. On Friday night, handlers were invited under the tent for pizza and there was a catered dinner on Saturday night.

Thanks to Roger and Heather and all those who pitched in to make this another great trial.
